About The Poet

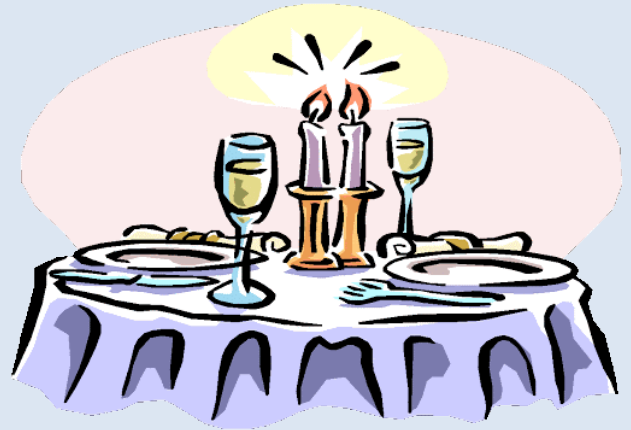

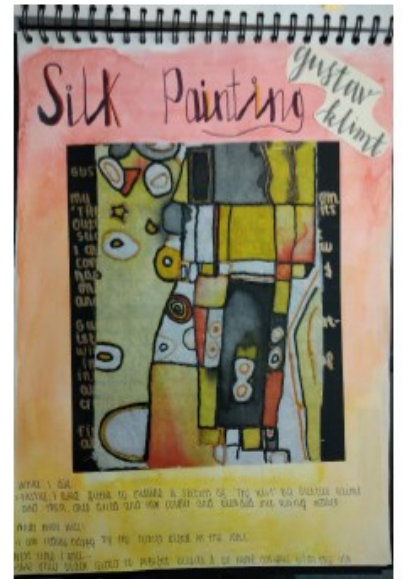

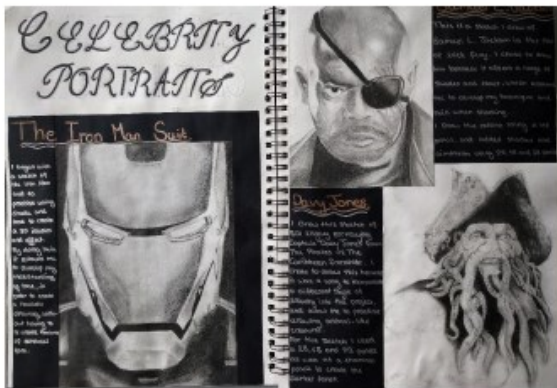

Not many people outside of the Art department see what is going on in the sketchbooks of our students so here is a little peep inside the sketchbooks of our current Year 11 students.

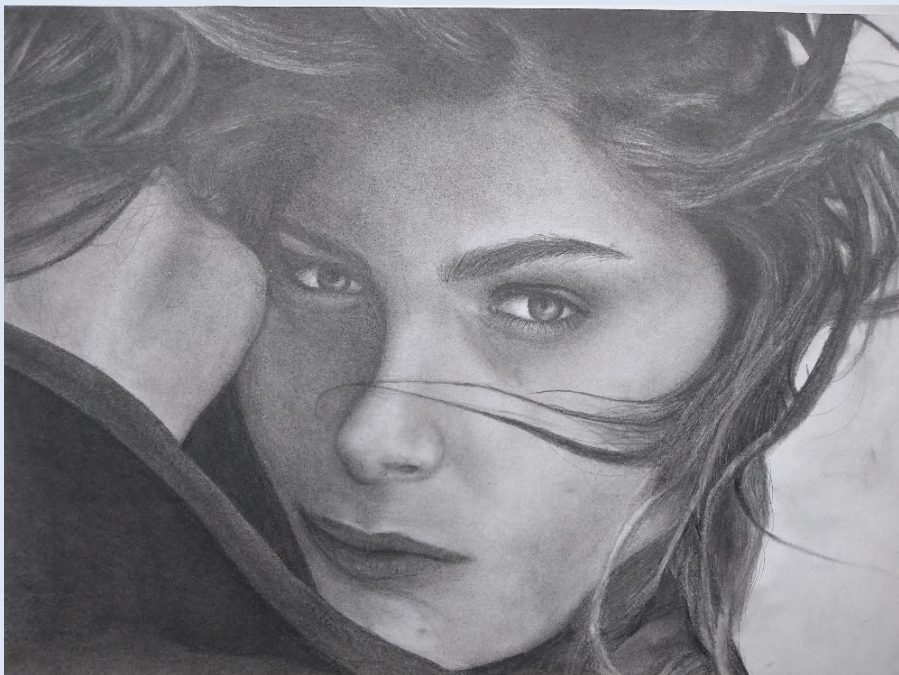

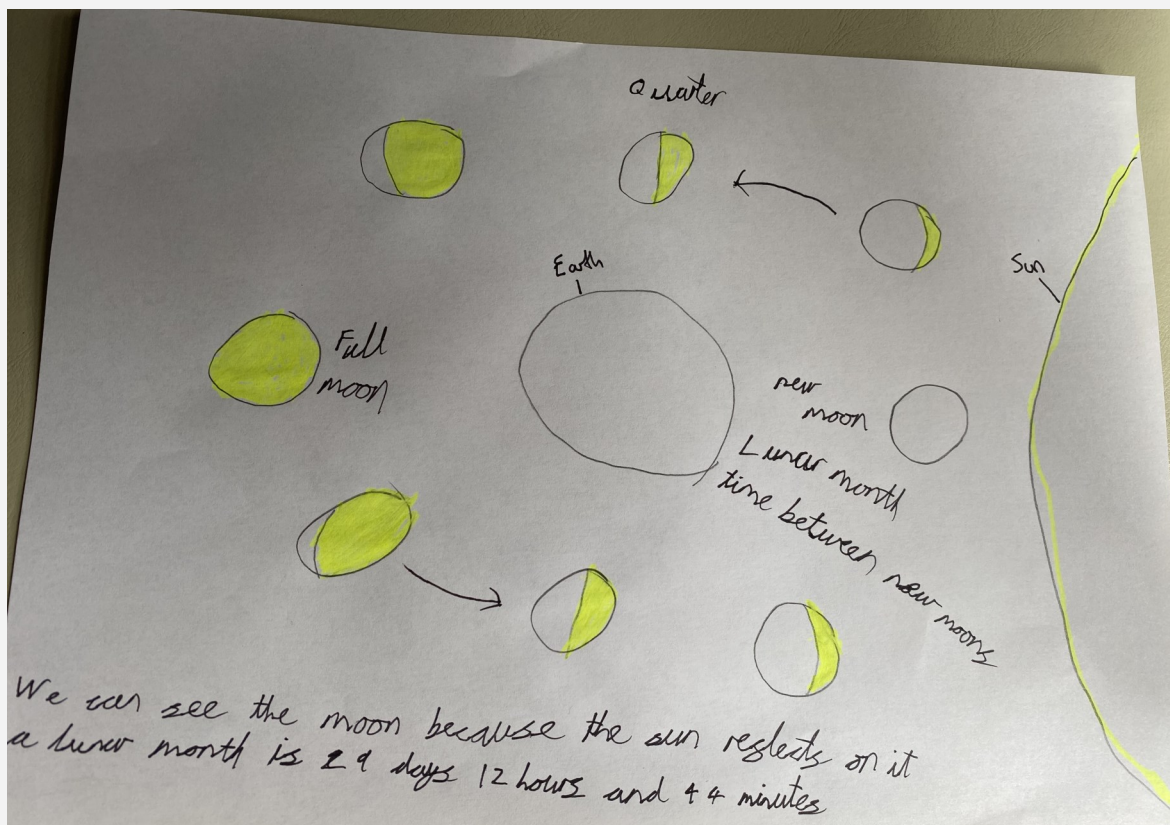

Below is a page from his document. To better enhance his work he spoke to his Grandparents who were alive during WW2 and especially his Grandad who also fought in the war. Well done Jamie, Mrs Woodford-Richens and Miss Uguen were very impressed with your hard work.

I have completed my call with a family member and my nan said the three biggest turning points in her life are getting a job she enjoyed doing which got her out of the office and into the parks being uncharge of sports grounds and trees, falling in love with my grandad and getting to know our family.

When I had a chat with my grandad who was a Royal Navy Sailor we even redid some of the alphabet word with grandad giving me details on these

BANANA LOAF

a warming banana loaf recipe, made using the ripest bananas. This delicious loaf cake, best served in thick slices, is one of the most popular recipes during lockdown.

INGREDIENTS

100g butter, soft

175g caster sugar

2 eggs

2 ripe mashed bananas

225g self raising flour

1 tsp baking powder

2 tbsp milk



INSTRUCTIONS

Lightly grease the loaf tin and line it with non-stick baking parchment. Pre-heat the oven to 180°C/350°F/Gas Mark 4. Measure all the ingredients into a mixing bowl and beat for about 2 minutes, until well blended; an electric mixer is best for this but of course you can also beat by hand with a wooden spoon.

Spoon the mixture into the prepared tin and level the surface. Bake for about 1 hour, until well risen and golden brown. A fine skewer inserted in the centre of the cake should come out clean.
