Message from The Editor, Miss Barker

A reminder to all students, parents and carers of the equipment that all students need to bring to school every day. Due to Covid 19, students are unable to borrow equipment so it is essential that they have their own equipment so they are ready to learn in every class. Please remind yourself using the photo to the right of what needs to be in a student's pencil case.

Face coverings are also an essential piece of equipment for daily life including in school. Please

make sure students have a mask with them every day. This needs to be worn in all communal areas of the school including corridors and when not eating in the canteen. Student's also need to wear a face covering when working closely with a member of staff in the classroom, who will also be wearing one. If a student forgets their face covering they can buy a disposable mask from Reception for 20p.

Your support and cooperation has meant that our attendance is at 92.7% which is 4.7% above the county average. We need to remain vigilant and continue as we are to keep everyone safe. We are incredibly proud of our students on how they have adapted to restrictions and continued to stay focused in lessons. We are also proud of our staff who have been providing high quality support and learning for all students, even those isolating. It shows what a fantastic school community we have here at Warblington and if we all work together as a team we can keep the school open and thriving.

To the right you can see one of our Gateway Maths classes with both a physical and virtual teacher, teaching from home due to shielding. Well done to Miss Elson for teaching expanding brackets from home and Mrs Crockford for supporting in school. All students were engaged and focused.

Dogwood Tree Factsheet



Understated until the colder months when it bursts into colour, Dogwood is a broadleaf shrub which thrives in damp woodland edges. It can typically be found growing along woodland edges and in hedgerows of southern England.

Mature trees can grow to 10m. The bark is grey and smooth with shallow ridges which develop with age, and its twigs are smooth, straight and slim. Leaf buds are black and look like bristles, forming on short stalks.

Quick Facts

Common Name: Dogwood

Scientific Name: *Cornus Sanguinea*

Family: Cornaceae

Origin: Native



The timber is so hard, it was used for crucifixes.

Where To Find Dogwood

Dogwood is native throughout Europe, Asia and North America. It is able to grow in damp conditions but can grow in many soil types. In the UK it can be seen growing wild along woodland edges and hedgerows. It is also a popular ornamental plant and is used in gardens to provide autumn and winter colour.

Value To Wildlife

The leaves are eaten by the caterpillars of some moths, including the case-bearer moth, while the flowers are visited by insects and the berries are eaten by many mammals and birds.
