The owner of one of the gardens that he works in along the north east boundary of the school in the 'Avenues' has kindly agreed to help the school with our project in the form of donations.





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Warblington School: The First Year Continued 1955 - 1956

September 1955 - When the school opened, there were many decisions to be made. The staff meeting in September agreed on a House system and selected 32 students to become Prefects.

March 1956 - Music and Drama performances were a hallmark of the school from the start. A special staff group was established and the school had two plays entered for the South East Hants Drama Festival in March. Regular Musical recitals by students and local ensembles performed the works of Mozart, Schmann and Greig. The Hampshire Rural Music String Festival was hosted by Warblington School for more than 50 students from various schools.

April 1956 - The staff spent the Easter holidays working on the school garden, the Science Department and the school field.

May 1956 - Uniforms were very expensive and not worn in primary schools. Discussion about the uniform went on throughout the year and finally, in May, the eagerly anticipated school

blazers arrived to be sold in school. The Art club also started in May.

June 1956 - Visits during the year included:

30 students going to Chichester to see a production of Treasure Island.

55 students going to the Empire Theatre in Portsmouth to see a production of Bizet's Carmen by the Portsmouth Operatic Society.

70 Year 8 students visiting the World Church Exhibition.

Year 7 trip to London Zoo in June.

24 students went to Paris for a week during the Easter holidays.

63 female students went to Wembley to see the England Vs. Holland hockey match.

There were also trips for netball matches, swimming, athletics and other sports.

July 1956 - The Prefects chose the name for the school magazine. It was called ALCLAD, the name of the material from which the school is made. ALCLAD is made of high purity aluminium bonded to a high strength aluminium alloy core, making it highly resistant to corrosion and extremely durable. A suitable metaphor for the school community. On the 27th July, the last day of term, ALCLAD, written and edited exclusively by the students of Warblington School released their first edition of the newsletter.

As a measure of the successful start, the HMI (the Ofsted of the time) were highly complementary of the school's progress on their termly visits.


