
Year 11 Well Done from Mrs Raistrick

Gardening







Our School Orchard

Martin Hampton, Wildlife Gardener has recently purchased four fruit trees for our orchard using the money from tree sponsorship. Here are the four trees he purchased:



2. Pear (Concorde) - This is a self-fertile variety which I have used for years and does very well. It will be ready to harvest in late September/early October.


3. Apple (Bramley's Seedling cooking apple) - This is a tough apple, usually heavy-fruiting unlike some apple varieties which can occasionally not fruit during some years and as a result very popular.

> 4. Crab Apple (Red Sentinel) - Crab Apple in an orchard is a fantastic way to ensure pollination of all the other dessert or cooking apples. The fruits of this variety are fantastic for making apple jam or jelly, because they're loaded with pectin (and also very useful therefore to add into other fruit jam making for example plums to help them set). It is also an excellent wildlife tree as any fruits unharvested will be eaten by birds.

I have a Walnut tree, which I would like to donate to the School. It's a tree with a great future, because of climate change, and will provide lots of Walnuts over time.

Warblington School: 1956 - 1957

The new school year of 1956 began with considerable excitement as it coincided with the opening of the Langstone Bridge. Warblington School hosted various dignitaries including the Minister of transport. 20 students served the 80 visitors a sit down meal and refreshments. Students from Hayling were now able to travel to school by bus. No excuses for being late!



The school was becoming a hub for a variety of community events. A plan for stage lighting was drawn up and the metalwork teacher and some students obtained permission to install a switchboard. This was funded by donations from parents and the community. The Headteacher had to go Havant Court to get a licence to allow the school to perform plays to the public. Later that year The Langstone Theatre group used the school for their performances of "The Emperor's New Clothes".

The school held its first Speech day in November with prizes presented for progress, achievement, sporting success and outstanding contributions to school life. In December, the school's production of Shakespeare's 'The Taming of The Shrew' on which '10 Things I Hate About You' is based, sold over 1000 tickets. The carol service for the public had a large congregation who were also able to see the school exhibition of Art and Crafts and Christmas cakes.

Sickness & Health

TB, or Tuberculosis was a common disease and prior to the development of antibiotics, was sometimes fatal. It is spread when people are in close contact for extended periods, such as in schools. All teachers and students over 13 were tested annually. In 1957, 20% of students were found to have the antibodies, showing they had been exposed to the disease. The following week, they all had an X ray to see if there had been any lung damage. The remainder were vaccinated. TB cases in the UK were reduced from 110,000 annual cases in 1913 to 5000 by 1987 but TB cases have increased since.

There was a real drive from Government to improve everyone's health so visits and inspections for all students by doctors, dentists and even opticians were a regular part of the school year.

Warblington School: 1956 - 1957 Sickness & Health Continued...

Early in September 1957, the first cases of Flu appear. Attendance fell to 83%. A month later, it was 63% but unlike many other schools, Warblington was able to stay open. Over 33, 000 people died from flu that year.

One annual event that struck terror in every school child's heart was the sudden arrival of the 'Nit' nurse, to check for head lice. Even the mention would cause a mass outbreak of itching. Anyone could get nits as they knew no social boundaries, so the nurses deemed it unnecessary to give anyone privacy. Thankfully, by July, the Head was able to record no 'dirty heads' had been found.
