A very warm welcome to Warblington School

Dear Prospective Parent/Carer

Thank you for taking an interest in our unique community. The is not a day goes by where I am not proud to be the Headteacher of this school and the community within it. Whilst the outside world continues to present challenges to us all, we strive to ensure that our students obtain the skills and qualifications that best prepare them to tackle those challenges and enable them to go on and have successful futures.

Despite this being my 21st year in teaching, I am consistently in awe of the character and resilience shown by our young people. Last year (2021-22) it was only year 10 that had experienced a full year in Warblington School before, yet the students made up for lost time, taking advantage of the range of activities that we were once again able to put on. Whether that was taking part in Sports Week, staying for rehearsals for the school show, going out on trips and visits or just being able to have Chrtistmas lunch or an assembly with the whole school together – it felt like we were, as a school at least, beginning to return to some form of normality. In a parents' survey last year (the results of which are in the Case Study 2021-22 Booklet, included in your pack), I was very pleased to see that parents felt their child was enjoying their time at Warblington – and felt we supported them well during these challenging times.

However, whilst returning to some old practices was fundamental to our community, it was important to ensure that our school improvement journey wasn't put to one side. This improvement journey is evident by the outcomes our Cohort 2022 who achieved fantastic results under very difficult circumstances, as for them exam went ahead as usual. I go on to talk in more depth around results later in this booklet, but I do want to congratulate each and every member of that cohort for their hard work and determination to become our new Warblington record breakers for GCSE results!

Warblington school has something quite special about it. We are a very small, but rapidly growing secondary school. At only 680 students we can do things differently here as we know individuals well. But it goes deeper than that. Everyone who visits will tell you just how welcoming the school



is for new staff and students – over 40 students joined us mid way through the year last year, with each one saying how they had settled in well and were enjoying school. It is a thriving community and I am proud to say our students are well behaved, friendly, kind and considerate. They welcome visitors and they are proud to speak of their school. Our staff are passionate about improving learning and aim to inspire and challenge the young people we work with. Whilst Ofsted recognized this in May 2018, a more recent inspection by the Hampshire Inspection Team noted, "During the learning walk all pupils were engaged in their lessons. It was evident that teachers had a strong presence and command within the classroom environment, with subtle cues to engage pupils who may be off task or unsettled following a transition. These 'behaviour of learning' techniques were evident across the school, with teachers skilfully using eye contact, hand gestures and body language, without interrupting the flow of the lesson. This ensured any low-level disruption was addressed swiftly and

meant behaviours did not manifest into something more. Behaviour seen throughout the day would align with the self evaluation, with the school being calm and orderly, with pupils following staff instructions with respect."

We understand that choosing a secondary school is a key decision. We believe that children have the right to the best education and during their time with us, we aim to equip all of our students with the skills they need to flourish in modern society; to make the best of opportunities and to be able to positively contribute once they leave Warblington School. I am pleased to say this was recognised during our recent inspection, where inspectors commented that "Pupils' personal development is outstanding". Work on this has continued to develop, and during our recent Hampshire Inspection,



it was commented that, "The enrichment curriculum covers careers, equality and diversity, relationship and sex education and safeguarding. ...all teachers deliver this within teams becoming more expert in their area. Leaders place value on this aspect of their work and this is highly visible across the school"



We have high aspirations for everyone who wears the Warblington School logo and we strive to improve ourselves through a clear focus on learning and achievement in a supportive environment. As a parent myself, I know that children and young people learn best in an environment which is secure, happy and caring. Our learning community works hard to create the right atmosphere and we pride ourselves on seeing each child as an individual. We take time to

celebrate achievements together, whether they are academic, sporting, artistic or dramatic.

Here at Warblington, we are committed to bringing the best out of each and every student entrusted to us and being a small secondary school allows us to get to know each individual and provide them with the support they need that will enable them to thrive.

Curriculum is very important to us and has played a key role in our improvement in outcomes. Further information on our curriculum can be found later in this booklet and on our website. Teachers here are passionate about the




subjects they teach and we believe students need to experience a wide range of subjects for as long as possible, which is why our options process begins at Christmas of year 9 and takes effect from that Easter, allowing us time to ensure each student gets the right level of advice and guidance to help them make informed choices. Finally, it is important to note that teaching and learning is at the heart of everything we do. Ofsted acknowledged that, "There are many strengths in the quality of teaching and learning" during their visit, and we have continued to develop this since. Our focus for this year is around 'Adaptive Teaching' and ensuring the climate for learning is excellent and again, this was acknowledged during our Hampshire Inspection in April 2021, with the report commenting, "Teaching and learning is stronger than previously seen. Leaders' efforts are focusing on retrieval, thinking hard and consideration on long term memory."

I hope you enjoy finding out about Warblington School, speaking to our amazing students and dedicated staff. Having access to a broad and balanced curriculum, and learning opportunities outside the classroom are key to our students developing into young adults.

I sincerely hope that we will be welcoming you into our community in September 2023, when hopefully the building will look very different to the way it does currently!

Our aim is to ensure that excellence is our expectation.

GCSE Outcomes 2022


This year the government and the exams regulator Ofqual replaced exams with a process based on Teacher Assessed Grades (TAGs), which were quality assured at several stages by the exam boards. This was an incredibly challenging time for the students and staff as we adapted to a fundamentally different form of assessment. Students had greater opportunity to perform across different pieces of evidence, resulting in a more holistic grade. We are incredibly proud of the achievements of all of our students, during what has been a challenging and unpredictable year.




The process of awarding grades this year ensured that students

were only assessed on content they have been taught; and this will be different across different schools and colleges, even within the same area. Our approach to assessing students was approved by the exam boards and focused around ensuring students were prepared for the next phase of their education. As a result of this, comparing schools performance will not happen this year, however I want to show everyone how well the cohort of 2021 achieved!

Warblington's Attainment 8 Score – the average grade achieved by a student across 8 subjects - has been steadily increasing, and is now within the range of being above the top 50% of schools for progress. (For comparison, targets for top 20% are included)





In maths and English, students now perform broadly in line with national average and progress is in line with national average. Our Ebacc results (those students who achieve passes in English, maths, Science, MFL and a humanities continues to be above the national average and shows we are well on course to meet the government targets for academic achievement in this area. Our 2021 results put us in the top 33% of school's nationally.

Inspection Reports

Whilst our most recent Ofsted inspection was May 2018, we have continued to work with the Hampshire Inspectorate and Advisory (HIAS) Team since this. Due to the time since the last Ofsted inspection, quotes from the HIAS team may give a better indication of where the school is currently at.

- The school's work to promote pupils' personal development and welfare is outstanding. For example, pupils become well versed in the articles in the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child, discussing these frequently to good effect.
- A parent whose daughter started school in the middle of an academic year wrote that, 'She is the happiest I have ever know her to be.' Another referred to a 'very positive experience of the school' over a number of years.
- The school's highly effective and consistent focus on respect for people's 'rights' contributes most effectively to pupils' evident good behaviour, respectful relationships with staff and consideration of those less fortunate than themselves.



- Teacher and pastoral staff contribute much to the high quality of care and support for pupils who have special educational needs (SEN) and/or disabilities, children looked after and those who are vulnerable. The needs of service children are considered well.
- The behaviour of pupils is good. The school's ethos and values of personal excellence, respect and friendship, inspiration, determination and courage, and equality contribute to how well pupils get on together.
- When asked how the school had changed in recent years, a Year 10 pupil said that 'pupils are so much nicer to each other'. Bullying is rare but, when it emerges, staff step in immediately so it does not escalate.

- The support staff and teaching staff spoken to during the visit were very clear that they would report any concerns about a child or a colleague and spoke confidently how they would do so. There is a real sense of it could happen here and that children come first. September 2019 – Safeguarding Inspection
- Leaders know their vulnerable pupils very well and can describe the pastoral support for each pupil and what they receive at the school, with a quarter of pupils at the school classed by leaders as vulnerable. Practices developed during lockdown are continuing with fortnightly 'in school' contact for the most vulnerable and a team around the child style meeting held internally at school consisting of staff responsible for medical, safeguarding, IT, special educational needs co-ordinator (SENCo), head of year, inclusion team and attendance to ensure pupils needs are catered for.
- The senior leaders responsible for the design and implementation of the behaviour policy should be congratulated as the impact of this was clearly evident.
 All staff and pupils commented upon the improvements in behaviour due to the change in behaviour policy.
 School Improvement Inspection January 2020

- Pupils were unanimous in their positive praise of how the school prepares them to reach their goals and career aspirations. On the day of the visit career interviews were taking place, with 100% of the year group involved.
- Behaviour seen throughout the day was good, with the school being calm and orderly, with pupils following staff instructions with respect.

School Improvement Inspection, April 2021

- There have been significant improvements in teaching and learning, as seen through the learning walk and through the staff surveys. Staff surveys extol the positive aspects on the continuing professional development (CPD) and coaching they are receiving
- Leaders are able to clearly articulate their approach and have a comprehensive system, with robust monitoring and tracking in place linked to the school performance management system.

School Uniform – Updating please!



Students are ambassadors of the school and are expected to show pride in the way they dress and behave in a way that reflects the standards we seek to achieve. The uniform should be smart with all items clearly marked. The school will NOT accept incorrect uniform. The Warblington School uniform consists of:

- Clip-on school tie
- Mid-blue shirt, plain, with collar and top button. (Not denim,

polo/t-shirt or blouse style)

- Black blazer with Warblington School Logo
- (Optional) School V Neck black jumper with blue stripe (no other jumpers are permissible)
- Black trousers embroidered with the Warblington School logo (available from Skoolkit) or tailored black trousers (embroidered badge available from school reception for acceptable trousers) or grey blue SK308 tartan skirt which must be knee length (available from Skoolkit only)
- Sensible, plain black footwear

Following student voice, from September 2022, tailored black shorts may also be worn

If cost of uniform is a problem, please contact the school. Available from xxx and xxx. We also have a second hand 'shop' No unreasonable haircuts or styles. Hair colour must be natural. Body piercings are unacceptable and must be removed. The only jewellery allowed is a watch and a pair of earrings (small studs, not hoops). Nose studs must be removed and replaced with a clear retainer. Nail varnish/acrylic nails must not be worn. False eyelashes

PE Kit

• Light blue sport polo shirt with the school logo

are not allowed and they will need to be removed.

- Maroon rugby shirt (with white band) required for boys only
- Gum shield for rugby and hockey
- Blue school PE hooded sweatshirt for girls (optional for boys)
- •Two pairs black shorts (one for indoor, one for outdoor use)
- Pair white ankle socks (indoor use)
- Pair of light blue three-quarter length socks (outdoor use)
- Black tracksuit bottoms (optional)
- Plain black leggings with school logo (optional for girls)
- •Trainers. Plimsolls and old 2G Astro trainers are not appropriate to use in the Sports Hall and Gymnasium. Trainers can be any colour. Studded boots boys only. Only the style shown in the picture is suitable for our 3G Astro, no blades or metal studs please. This style of boot shown is equally the right boot for grass and for rugby as well.



Getting to School



Warblington School and The Travel Planning Team at Hampshire County Council has been working together to produce two bespoke maps to support students with travelling actively and sustainably to/from school. You can also use the QR code on the maps to go to the website and zoom in on specific areas.






Being Ready to Learn

Everyday starts with a Tutor Time to enable students to meet with their tutor and follows a programme of assemblies, numeracy activities, weekly debate / discussion and a culture activity.

We operate a split break for break times so not all year groups are out together, alleviating some of the canteen queues and meaning there is space to eat during wet weather.

Every day has STAR time (Sit Together and Read) where students are expected to bring their own book and read for pleasure. Those who require interventions for reading will have them at this time so they are not being removed from lessons.

On a Friday during STAR time, students meet their tutors to enable a check out time and to enable Ready to Learn celebrations and Tutor activities.



Homework and Communications



Homework is set via an online app called Classcharts. Classcharts allows instant access to how your child is doing in school. It has real-time data, detailing positive and negative classroom behaviours, and any homework set. The app also allows students to message their teachers and for the school to make announcements to students.



Some homework is set via other online learning platforms, other homeworks are set and can be submitted back via Classcharts. Other homeworks are still required to be completed using old fashioned pen and paper!

Parental communications are via Weduc. This is another essential app and is where you will receive official communications, timetables, progress reports and attendance information. The app also allows you to submit any absence requests, changes to personal details and complete any medical forms.



After School Clubs

There are always a large number of clubs and activities your child can get involved with after school. We would encourage all students to get involved in some form of activity, but equally understand that many of our students already have commitments after school. We like celebrate those students via our newsletters and in assemblies.







Attendance Expectations

What does good attendance look like?

Research shows a correlation between high attendance and high attainment. Students who attend regularly will typically achieve higher grades in assessments or examinations, have greater social skills and have the benefit of a rounded education.



At the same time, we do recognise that children become ill from time to time and that issues can arise that prevent a student from maintaining the desired level of attendance. Should this be the case, we work closely with students and families to provide support and guidance in order to provide continuity of access to education. Having a full-time Attendance Officer ensures that we are able to respond promptly to any attendance related concerns whilst also promoting success through our Pastoral teams.


